<u>Submission in relation to Kelland Homes submission for rezoning of land adjacent to Elder Heath</u> residential development (reference: SD-C195-172)

We would like to correct a number of misleading information provided by Kelland Homes in their submission for proposed rezoning.

They depict the land proposed for rezoning as a sort of 'no man's land' with the potential to fuel antisocial behavior ("The absent land under the overhead power cables have left this edge feeling somewhat unresolved and subject to potential anti-social activity.") However, nothing could be further from the truth. The only anti-social behaviour that can be witnessed there is grazing and we believe that the cattle is doing so in full agreement with the land owner. A lot of wildlife is regularly being observed on the proposed site for rezoning that would be invisible to a profit-obsessed developer such as foxes, deer, pheasants and a huge variety of birds that would require proper surveying along with bats and other mammals. Trees and hedgerows on site are likely to be century-old and under environmental law would require full protection and not just a vague 'we will do our best to keep some of it'. The mention of potential anti-social behaviour occurring on site is grounded in the stigmatization of the local community which is another proof if needed that developers are well-disconnected from the places that they are supposed to enhance.
